



EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 121

STAY AT HOME ORDER AND STRATEGIC DIRECTIONS FOR NORTH CAROLINA IN RESPONSE TO INCREASING COVID-19 CASES

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the undersigned issued Executive Order No. 116 which declared a State of Emergency to coordinate the State's response and protective actions to address the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) public health emergency and to provide for the health, safety, and welfare of residents and visitors located in North Carolina ("Declaration of a State of Emergency").

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States declared the ongoing COVID-19 outbreak a pandemic of sufficient severity and magnitude to warrant an emergency declaration for all states, tribes, territories, and the District of Columbia pursuant to Section 501(b) of the Robert T. Stafford Dissater Relief and Emergency Assistance Act, 42 U.S.C. 5121-5207

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States pursuant to Sections 201 and 301 of the National Emergencies Act, 50 U.S.C. § 1601, et seq. and consistent with Section 1135 of the Social Security Act, as amended (42 U.S.C. § 1320b-5), declared that the COVID-19 pandemic in the United States constitutes a national emergency, retroactive to March

EXECUTIVE ORDER NO. 141

EASING RESTRICTIONS ON TRAVEL, BUSINESS OPERATIONS, AND MASS GATHERINGS: PHASE 2

WHEREAS, on March 10, 2020, the undersigned issued Executive Order No. 116 which declared a State of Emergency to coordinate the State's response and protective actions to address the Coronavirus Disease 2019 ("COVID-19") public health emergency and provide for the health, safety, and welfare of residents and visitors located in North Carolina; and

WHEREAS, on March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization declared COVID-19 a global pandemic; and

WHEREAS, on March 13, 2020, the President of the United States issued an emergency declaration for all states, tribes, territories, and the District of Columbia, retroactive to March 1, 2020, and the President declared that the COVID-19 pandemic in the United States constitutes a national emergency: and

WHEREAS, on March 25, 2020, the President approved a Major Disaster Declaration, FEMA-4487-DR, for the State of North Carolina; and

WHEREAS, in responding to the COVID-19 pandemic, and for the purpose of protecting the health, safety, and welfare of the people of North Carolina, the undersigned has issued Executive Order Nos. 116-122, 124-125, 129-131, 133-136, and 138-140; and

WHEREAS, more than twenty thousand people in North Carolina have had laboratoryconfirmed cases of COVID-19, and hundreds of people in North Carolina have died from the disease; and

WHEREAS, hospital administrators and health care providers have expressed concerns that unless the spread of COVID-19 is limited, existing health care facilities may be insufficient to care for those who become sick; and

WHEREAS, the undersigned and the Secretary of Health and Human Services have



Dear Governor Cooper:

The hotel & lodging industry appreciates the productive steps taken to limit the spread of coronavirus/COVID-19 in our State. The steps you and Secretary Cohen have taken have clearly made a difference in how the pandemic has impacted citizens and businesses in North Carolina.

In your Executive Orders, hotels have been listed as essential businesses. Hotels truly are essential businesses, as they provide accommodations for leisure travelers, local residents who may be temporarily displaced, essential government travelers, first responders, and others who are necessary to fighting the spread of disease. Hotels are also helping at-risk and homeless clients, as well as those engaged in essential businesses and operations, including transportation, logistics and others critical to the state's response.

One of the greatest impacts of the COVID-19 response on the hotel & lodging industry, and the travel & tourism economy in general, has been the limit on events and mass gatherings. The inability of hotels to service any event consisting of more than 10 participants has had the effect of grinding the largest part of our business to a complete stop. A full-service hotel cannot survive without group meeting business.

As North Carolina now takes steps to reopen much of the economy in a safe manner, we urge adaptation of revised limits that are commensurate with the opening of other sectors that will lead to the safe and responsible congregation of groups in confined spaces, consistent with guidelines and practices that have been put into place for restaurants and related businesses.

Legislative Items We Are Still Fighting For

- Dedicated small business loan program for restaurants and hotels
 - HB 1224 introduced by Republican leadership and bipartisan support SB 788 companion.
- Allow restaurants and bars to make up reduced capacity by outdoor dining
 - HB 536 passed Senate and House and awaiting action by Governor Cooper.
- Further liability protection past state of emergency
- Allow for restaurants to offer to go and delivery cocktails
- Clarification of meals tax collection and remittance by third-party delivery services
 - Provision in HB 1080 waiting to be heard in House Rules before heading to House floor.
- Additional funding for tourism promotion through VisitNC
