Duke Energy announces key Economic Development leadership changes in North Carolina

CHARLOTTE, N.C. – Duke Energy has made two key leadership changes within the economic development program in North Carolina. Andrew Tate has been named Duke Energy's new director of economic development for North Carolina, leading the team that works to attract businesses to the state by offering custom solutions to power quality and reliability needs.

John Geib, who has directed the company's economic development team in North Carolina for the past 12 years, has been appointed to a new enterprise-wide role as director technical services for Duke Energy's economic and business recruitment team. This team will focus on developing innovative technical solutions to project challenges and enhancing the competitiveness of power offerings throughout the Duke Energy regulated service area.

Both Tate and Geib will report to Stuart Heishman, vice president of economic development and business recruitment for Duke Energy.

Duke Energy's approach to economic development is unique in the utility industry. The team partners with its local, regional and state economic development organizations in attracting new industry and has an enterprise-wide business recruitment team that identifies and proactively recruits national and international manufacturing companies to its entire service territory.

"Over the past 15 years, we've been laser-focused on the three legged stool of site readiness, industrial recruitment and project management," said Heishman. "We are excited to add a fourth leg to the stool by creating a technical services team under John's leadership. The addition of Andrew Tate will position both the company and North Carolina for economic development success. Andrew is a seasoned leader with strong experience and solid connections in North Carolina economic development circles."

Prior to joining Duke Energy, Tate was vice president of real estate for North Carolina Railroad Company, and for a decade prior to that, he served as the president and CEO of Henderson County Partnership for Economic Development. A past president of the North Carolina Economic Development Association Board of Directors, he holds a bachelor's degree from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.
